KRC works to protect and restore Kentucky's rivers, streams and wetlands.

Since 1984, the Kentucky Resources Council, a non-profit, membership-based organization dedicated to the conservation and prudent use of Kentucky's natural resources, has worked to ensure that individuals impacted by environmental decisions have a voice in the policy-making process. Across the Commonwealth, the KRC provides consistent, aggressive advocacy on environmental and public health issues by monitoring and educating the public on permits, regulations, and legislation; facilitating networking among environmental and citizen groups; and providing indirect and direct legal representations without charge.

Described as "an environmental M·A·S·H unit," the KRC is always on call – ready to provide assistance to those who live downhill, downwind, and downstream – whose homes, health, lands, and quality of life are damaged or threatened by irresponsible development of our natural resources and pollution. From reforming mining laws to protecting Black Mountain, the Pine Mountain Settlement School, Cumberland Gap's Fern Lake, and UK's Robinson Forest from mining, from legislative advocacy in Frankfort to case-by-case assistance on air, land, water, and resource extraction issues, the KRC has indeed "stood in the gap."
